This template can be used for multiple purposes:

 It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	78%	47 pupils out of 60 children can swim competently and confidently over a distance of at least 25 metres. This is an increase of 8% from previous cohort.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	78%	47 pupils out of 60 children can use a range of strokes effectively. This is an increase of 8% from previous cohort.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	80%	48 pupils out of 60 children are able to perform a safe self-rescue in water-based situations. This is a decrease of 1% from previous cohort.
